VIEW FROM THE CHAIR: By Kevin Chard (Chairman).

February 2024

e seem to have settled our venue and storage issues so that we are able to continue to function. We have a new home for Tuesday evening meetings at St. Paul's Church at Bursledon. There will be winners and losers in terms of travel, but the venue is much more modern, has a better kitchen and others facilities plus ample car parking.

We have found storage space for the Collection, Auction and Library. This is all off-site and so access is more limited than in the past, see notes on the Auction below and the Library elsewhere in postmark. My thanks to Debbie and Jack Hindson for giving the collection a secure new home.

The upshot of all this is that although there is now no urgency, we are still open to finding a perfect solution. Not sure that is possible on our budget, Bugle Street was cheap because of the condition of the premises. Any thoughts still welcomed.

Auction;

We successfully ran a normal January Auction in our new venue.

Going forward there will be some changes. Storage is limited and off-site. We will therefore limit the number of bulky lots (defined as items contained in an album, stock book or small box / bag) to no more than 150 per auction. These can be held in locked cabinets at our new storage space. Very large boxes of material (glory box type) will not fit in these cabinets and will only be accepted at the owner's risk. Alternatively, such lots can be brought to the venue by the vendor on the day.

Some of the capacity will be given over to smaller items; single stamps / album pages / etc – referred to as folder lots in the past. My aim though is to not use folders going forward – they increase the bulk of storing significantly. Vendors are requested to ensure there is sufficient packaging to protect their lots, which will now be stored as 20 items in a plastic folder.

The April Auction will contain a lot of material re-offered with lower reserves – some of these reductions are substantial. So, bargains to be had for bidders

but with the downside that Society revenue will be lower than what we are used to.

Ahead of the next Tuesday evening Auction in April, we have a membersonly Auction in Chandler's Ford on Saturday 23rd March – full details on the website. Pete Bruce organises these events and the material now comes from a series of estate sales.

Material for Auctions:

We are not able to simply take in material as we have in the past. Instead, we are asking vendors to submit lists, ideally in an electronic format, and we will call in material when we are able to store and list. I am anticipating that we will be looking for a normal amount of material from the July auction onwards. Please advise if items are bulky, small or album size, see notes above, normally easy enough to judge but I have been surprised in the past! Lists will be called in based on type and then on a first come first served basis.

Society Roles:

The AGM will also be held in April. If you are interested in getting involved with running the Society, now is the time to volunteer. Although I am not aware of any vacancies, there are committee members feeling the strain and I am sure we can find something to interest you and help us. Just speak to any Committee member.

A longer-term solution for the Auction (and potentially the Library) could be a member who has storage space at home – making working on Auction lists and access to the material far easier. Let me know if this is something you would be interested in.

That's all folks – I am hoping for a quieter period over the next few months!

s a result of the upheaval following our departure from Bugle Street the Library has been temporarily moved to a garage to which I have no access. There is still access to the library but on a very restricted basis. Therefore for the foreseeable future the membership should consider the library closed.

PACKET MANAGERS REPORT: By Mel Bradshaw.

he Packet Circuit has had a very good year, with an improvement on 2022 results. 24 circuit boxes were audited and paid during 2023. Sales from these boxes amounted to £11.246.95, with commission payable to the society of £1.125.04. A further £24.36 was paid to the society as the additional levy paid by non-members who submit booklets. My thanks to everyone who has contributed to this success-whether by submitting booklets or purchasing from booklets on the circuit. We are fortunate that compared with many other societies the number of members receiving the packets has grown to over 50, excluding those on the Isle of Wight.

The necessity to change our meeting venue has affected the Isle of Wight involvement. Although it is still intended that packets will regularly go to the island, this will depend on visiting the island to exchange packets or liaise with IOW members who visit the mainland on odd occasions. This will affect the time taken for some packets to be paid and possibly the frequency of boxes sent to the island.

To date 2 boxes were audited and paid in January: sales were £651, with total payment to the Society of £68. Sales from boxes currently in circulation exceed £4,700. We have approximately 300 books submitted for future circulation. Although, this sounds a lot they will probably only supply about 6 months of boxes at the normal distribution rate. Further booklets are always welcome to help maintain the stock, and hence the variety and value of individual boxes.

I have received a fresh supply of booklets from Prinz and the price has gone down!! Booklets cost 25p each, any postage will be added to the invoice if they are sent by post. Please let me know if you require any and I'll arrange delivery by the cheapest method!

An increasing number of members have been paying for their purchases by bank transfer. If you do this it is essential that the payment slips are either posted to me or scanned and emailed to melbradshaw44@gmail.com immediately. The scans need to be clear and readable when enlarged, if necessary, for printing.

QEII DECIMAL MINT POSTAGE STAMPS.





I found this wrapper on a well know Auction Website and picked it up relatively cheaply. What interested me with this wrapper, it was sent from London to Southampton. I am still working on the name and address to see if I can find out more information. The hand cancel is very poor so I have yet to work out the date but I think it could be early 19C. As I say it was posted from London and hand written in the bottom left corner is 'Secretary of state's Office'. Top right hand corner is 'On **His** Majesty's Service'. So it must have been prior to Queen Victoria (1819 To 1901) as it is 'His Majesty's Service', so it must be William IV 1830-1837 or possibly earlier.

This is going to be very interesting to try and work out when it was sent and also it appears to have the name 'William Pollock'???? Hopefully I can update the members in a few months.

IONIAN ISLANDS STAMPS... By Peter Bruce.

JANUARY 2024.



the south west coast of Greece and comprise main islands and a number of smaller islands. Probably the best known is Corfu.

In 1797 these islands were taken over by France, then under the rule of Napoleon Bonaparte. After his defeat at Waterloo the Treaty of Paris in 1815 gave sovereignty of the islands to Britain and they remained under British rule until 1864 when they were returned to Greece.

When the Penny Black was introduced in 1840 the postal system in the islands used British stamps with a Crowned Circle handstamp. Then in 1859 a set of three stamps was issued for use in the islands. A recent collection that has come to SDPS for auction has a mint set of these stamps.

The three stamps show a picture of Queen Victoria similar to that used on the Penny Black. They were printed in three colours to designate the value as no numbers were printed on the stamp. The ½d was printed in orange-yellow, the 1d in blue and the 2d in red. 50000 sets were printed by Perkins Bacon.

One oddity is the watermarks on the stamps. The ½d has no watermark, the 1d has a large outlined number 2 and the 2d has a large outlined number 1. It may be that the colours allocated for the 1d and 2d were exchanged at the last minute by the postal authorities after the printing had taken place.

The stamps are quite rare if genuinely postally used and command a high value. The mint stamps are still uncommon and both mint and used have been extensively forged.

The stamps in the collection appear to be genuine. There is a very helpful website, part of Blogspot.com, which lists the various forgeries. Most of them are easy to spot, being poor quality blurred printing. Others have distorted lettering or the wrong number of holes in the belt at the bottom of the portrait.

After 1864 when the islands became part of Greece again Greek stamps were used, and these three stamps were then obsolete, although it appears that some were used even as late as 1945 if Stanley Gibbons is to be believed!

OLD GRAHAM'S PHILATELIC TALES No 4... By Graham Coles. January 2024



ornflakes and Forgeries. Forgeries and Cornflakes. These are two words that you don't often see together, so I thought it was best to say it twice. One of the best resourced forging rings of the mid-Twentieth Century used the code word "Cornflakes" to throw a deep shadow over their activities. Now it is time to throw some light into this mysterious world.

Operation Cornflakes was masterminded by the American Office of Strategic Services, (OSS), and it involved tricking the German postal services (Deutsch Reichpost) into delivering anti-Nazi propaganda to German citizens. The operation used special aeroplanes that dropped bags of false, but properly addressed, post into the vicinity of bombed out mail trains. The ruse was that the postal service would then confuse the false post with the real post, and deliver the propaganda to German homes. Firstly, the Office of Strategic Services had to forge, and print convincing six and twelve pfennig stamps of Adolf Hitler. Together with the printed materials, they also enclosed another design, here the twelve pfennig stamp was redrawn to show his exposed skull, and the words "Deutsch Reich" were changed to "Futsches

Reich" (meaning Collapsed Empire. This latter stamp is known as the "Death Head" stamp, and a total of 96000 were produced.

Addresses were obtained by a careful trawling of German telephone directories; in the end over 2 million names were collected. Some authorities have suggested that documents were produced in neutral Switzerland as well as in England, but I doubt this as the Swiss had no wish to offend their neighbour.

The first mission of Operation Cornflakes took place on the 5th of January or the 5th of February 1945, again sources differ on this point! A postal train bound for Linz was first bombed, and then a second wave of American P-38 fighter bombers dropped bags containing about 3800 propaganda letters on the site of the wreck. Deutsch Reichpost then obligingly picked everything up, and delivered them. The OSS had had to forge the mailbags, and postal markings to fool the Germans. Prisoners of War were bribed with better food to provide the information, and spies collected examples of the mail bags.

Most of the fake post had return addresses for legitimate businesses, like the Wiener Giro-und Kassenverein. This latter address eventually blew the operation's cover when an OSS operative writing out the addresses misspelled the name as "Cassenverein". One of the postal clerks spotted the misspelling, and it turned up on several envelopes, arousing suspicion. The envelopes were opened, and the propaganda discovered.

Some 20 loads of fake post were dropped in a total of 320 mailbags with more than 96000 pieces of propaganda in the last days of the war. Nobody is quite sure how effective this particular "black operation" was in the light of the other stresses the Germans were under. President Franklin D. Roosevelt as the ultimate boss of the OSS received copies of the stamps for his collection. This came to light when the late President's stamp collection was sold in the 1940s. Please note that they have been extensively forged by others since the Second World War.

Why was it called "Cornflakes"?, because the recipients would get their post at breakfast time!

t least one other example of the SOUTHAMPTON OXFORD SI postmark exists. Dave Lewis of Southampton Society showed me an example that he only recently acquired at the Thursday afternoon meeting of Southampton DPS on 11th January 2024.





Dave's copy is on a QV postal stationery wrapper which is unused and SO was probably cancelled order. The to applied carefully hand stamped mark exactly covers the ONE PENNY QV indicium and while

readable with a magnifying glass will not show well in a scan.

The "SI" is complete with "T" underlined and raised. The code at the top is "M" and the date "SP 29 / 92".

Page 31 of Postmarks and Postal Markings of Southampton - by Bryan Hunt, March 1986, lists "OXFORD STREET" under SINGLE RING DATE STAMPS 1870-1914. No image is shown. Now we know of two instances.

My thanks to Dave for spotting the mark in his collection having seen the article in the adjacent illustration in the winter 2023 edition of the Southampton DPS *Postmark* magazine.

Stanley was born in 1931 in Ware, Hertfordshire when his mother was 48. This was almost a record at the time, and it is one of the reasons, why Stanley outlived all his relatives. He had a happy childhood there before his family moved to the greater London area. While in the Capital, Stanley was impressed by the trolley buses, and in later life he painted a scene from those distant years:



Stanley became a philatelist as a schoolboy and managed to establish correspondence with the Postmaster of Pitcairn Island, as well as other exotic places. He witnessed the Blitz of London and admired King George V1.

Stanley joined the Church Army at a young age and became a Captain. He worked tirelessly in order to help those in need. He also worked with the British Forces in Austria and Germany where he

learned the language fluently. He later went to Bible College and became ordained as a vicar in The Church of England.

Stanley decided on a change of career and then joined the Merchant Navy as a Catering Officer. He became a skilful Chef and worked at sea for many years, mostly on the Ocean Liners of the Shaw, Savill & Albion Line. His favourite ships were SS Ocean Monarch, SS Southern Cross and SS Northern Star. With them Stanley had the chance to be awarded shore leave in dozens of countries, but nothing surpassed the islands of French Polynesia.

He spoke about the South Pacific with great enthusiasm and gathered a full stamp collection of those territories, so that he could see regularly his most beloved places.

Stanley retired in 1985 and settled in Southampton. His exceptional longevity and vitality were due to his belief that mind and body can only serve you if you regularly challenge them. Stanley used to have an Indoor Exercise Bike and numerous hobbies. He used to regularly climb the West End Hill in his 80-s. He loved mathematics and was solving equations in his free time. Almost until the end he was able to list all US Presidents and name all the States Capitals. He was able to recognise instantly many thousands of stamps, and to comment on their country, era and printing technique. Stanley was a prolific artist, and a few pubs in Southampton have one or more of his paintings. Also, he was a talented Organ Player. Stanley was deeply saddened by the suffering of children around the world and supported several charities until the very end.

The Covid Pandemic did not directly hurt Stanley but forced him to change his lifestyle to gradual detriment. He was afraid of the Virus, so between March 2020 and July 2021 he didn't venture beyond his garden. We were visiting him when the lockdown rules allowed that but only in his garden and from a safe distance. Stanley's health deteriorated seriously last Spring and he had a few spells in the General Hospital. He passed away peacefully on 11 December in the Mountbatten Hospice.

Stanley will be remembered for his original appearance, and particularly his collection of hats and the associated badges. His memory will live through his paintings and all the good deeds he completed during his long life.

CROMWELL'S PROTECTORATE, 1635 ~ 1658... By Malcolm Montgomery (MBE)... February 2024.

It may come as no great surprise that very little mail appears to have survived from this period ... putting one's name to a letter was tantamount to signing one's death warrant, and keeping other correspondence could prove equally dangerous. Further, although the Proclamation of 1635 gave authority to Thomas Witherings to establish posts and cross-posts and an Ordinance of 1654 gave Manley a monopoly of the posts and instructions to establish a post to Portsmouth, there is no specific authority for a regular mail service between Portsmouth and Southampton at this time.

Portsmouth to Southampton, 15th August 1655.

'For the Ho'ble Commisioners sitting at Southampton; The Lord Richard Cromwell, Richard Maijor Esq, Collonell Norton & John Dunche, Esq, humble present these at the Dolphin in Sothton.'

A letter in part concerning an insurrection in Wiltshire and the threat to Southampton carried privately from Major Peter Murford, Lieutenant Governor of Portsmouth, to Lord Richard Cromwell and the Commissioners at the Dolphin in Southampton. The main purpose of the letter, however, was to complain about the behaviour of two visitors to Portsmouth from Southampton who had insulted the Mayor of Portsmouth and failed to obey even the behavioural expectations that city.

The letter, addressed to Richard Major's residence was intended for the commissioners who met at the Dolphin ... that hostel is still there, but now more famous as the site of Jane Austen's eighteenth birthday party ... When I approached them, I do not believe that they had any idea of the connection with Richard Cromwell.

- 1. 'A Proclamation for the settling of the Letter-Office', 31st July 1635.
- 2. September 1654: An Ordinance touching the Office of Postage of Letters, Inland and Foreign.', *Acts and Ordinances of the Interregnum, 1642-1660* (1911), pp. 1007 -1013. This included '...a weekly post between Dover and Portsmouth, and between Portsmouth and Salisbury...', but sensitive information in these uncertain times would most likely be carried only by trusted messengers.
- 3. Richard Cromwell, 1626-1712, third son of Oliver Cromwell, second Lord Protector of England, Scotland and Ireland, serving for just under nine months, 3^{rd} September 1658 until 25^{th} May 1659.

My Dearest

With these are two Bills of Exchange wch. you may desyre Mr. Pack to reedime for you, only you must put yor. hand on theyr backside as he will direct you. The third noate pray keepe by you for about as short as you can gett Conuenientie to demand it, for wch. you may write to Mrs. Lowdon to speake to him Mr Knight of Deale. And what you riteine pray put downe in yr. booke of Brother Gefferyes ac. Iff you come bring soape as one to use it, I want gloves wch. pray let bee thin, & big enough also. A hat band, some linnen, or threaded sock big enough, some sugar & flowre, if you can send or bring it; we may haply goe into Queenbrough to cleane. Goe wth. respects I am in some hast Thine Geo. Swanley Brother Geffery desyres you write to

Plymouth of his health here yesterday went into ye polymote frigott.'

A brief letter from Captain George Stanley, son of Captain Richard Stanley (famous for taking the surrender of Southampton in the Civil War and the capture of the Isle of Wight forts), to his wife on his return from the Battle of Lowestoft, in which his vessel paid a significant role. The ship had returned to Queensborough for cleansing. It may be no coincidence that his ship was held in that port for 'cleansing' as, in the first four months of that year, there had been a significant rise in the number of reported cases of bubonic plague (although it may be stretching the facts a little to presume that it had been recognised that his ship had been in proximity with the Dutch fleet at Lowestoft). That apart, two weeks later Captain Stanley was dead ... but I have been unable to trace the cause of his death.
